### Position Overview

The court is accepting applications for a full-time, term law clerk position in our Fresno office. The incumbent will work for U.S. Magistrate Judge Sheila K. Oberto and will complete research and writing on a wide range of issues that arise in federal litigation. This will include substantively reviewing pleadings, preparing bench memos, and drafting orders on matters pending before the judge. The initial term of appointment will be one year (subject to renewal) with an expected start date of employment either on or shortly after March 3, 2014.

### Minimum Qualifications

For consideration, applicants must be law school graduates with strong academic records and possess excellent research and writing skills. Candidates also must possess strong case management skills and the ability to work independently in a production oriented, high-volume work environment. Candidates who possess two or more years of post-graduate civil litigation and/or federal clerkship experience are highly preferred.

To qualify for appointment at a JSP grade 11 step 1 (\$57,982), an applicant must be a law school graduate and have the equivalent of one year of full-time legal work experience after graduation from law school. Substitutions for the one year of experience are permitted and include the following:

- Graduation in the upper third of a law school class;
- Experience on the editorial board of a law review; publication of a noteworthy article in a law school student or scholarly publication;
- Special high-level honors for academic excellence in law school, such as election to the Order of the Coif;
- Winning of a moot court competition or membership on a moot court team that represents the law school in competition with other law schools; participation in the legal aid or other law school clinical program;
- Or summer experience as a law clerk to a state or local judge or law clerk experience on a continuous basis in a private firm while attending law school.

For appointment at a JSP grade 12 step 1 (\$69,497), an applicant must meet the qualifications for a JSP grade 11, possess one additional year of full-time legal work experience after graduation from law school (no substitutions permitted) AND be a member of the Bar of a state, territorial, or Federal Court of general jurisdiction.

For appointment at a JSP grade 13 step 1 (\$82,642), an applicant must meet the qualifications for a JSP grade 12 and possess at least one additional year of full-time legal work experience after graduation from law school (no substitutions permitted).
